STRATFORD TOWN CENTRE FOOD FESTIVAL



It's all about local at the Stratford Town Centre Food Festival with Loxleys back as the sponsor of the popular event.

Preparations are underway for this year's festival, showcasing Stratford as a premier food and drink destination.

The free event on the weekend of September 23rd and 24th will boast a bustling producers' market, demonstrations and hands-on workshops, with popular trails taking visitors to many of the town's independent businesses.

The festival - one of several Stratforward-organised events throughout the year - is backed again by local restaurant Loxleys, which has supported it for the past three years.

General Manager Jonathan Lea said: "Loxleys is delighted to once again be sponsoring the Stratford Town Centre Food Festival. Last year's event was a huge success and we're sure this year's will be even better.

"Food and drink is such a key part of what Stratford offers, not just to locals but to our international visitors, and the festival is the perfect chance to showcase our thriving food and drink scene."

The Stratford Town Centre Food Festival attracted more than 80,000 people last year bringing increased footfall to businesses across the town centre.

Alongside the market, the festival will feature an action-packed programme of demonstrations from town centre chefs and producers at The Waterside Cookery Theatre, plus workshops and hands-on classes for adults and children alike at other venues across the town centre as well as the return of the popular Taste and Ale Trails.

WATCH OUT FOR FAKE BANKNOTES

It's come to our attention that a number of counterfeit banknotes have been circulating around town, both English and Scottish.

To help businesses look out for the fakes, the Town Hosts are in the process of distributing some handy z-cards from the Bank of England with an easy to follow guide to checking banknotes.

They include step-by-step instructions for checking £10, £20 and £50 paper notes, as well as £5 and £10 polymer notes.

For the paper notes you should check the watermark, the hologram or holographic strip, the paper and raised print and the ultraviolet features. You can also check the metallic thread and microlettering.

For polymer notes, check the see-through window, foil patches, the polymer and raised print, ultraviolet and microlettering. Similar checks apply for the three different types of Scottish notes - including checking the watermark or hologram. Our Town Hosts are distributing 'Know Your Scottish Banknotes' posters to several shops around town to raise awareness and also to act as a deterrent to people tempted to use counterfeit notes.

SHAKESPEARE BIRTHPLACE TRUST CREATES SPECIAL NEW PLACE GIN

The Shakespeare Birthplace Trust has teamed up with local gin company Shakespeare Distillery to produce a special batch of gin made from fruit from two historic mulberry trees in Shakespeare's New Place.

The Shakespeare Distillery's New Place Mulberry Gin combines its award-winning Stratford Gin, which uses botanicals that would have been common in Shakespeare's time with fruit from the two historic trees.

One is the oldest mulberry tree in the Great Garden at New Place, reputed to have been grown from a cutting taken from a mulberry tree originally planted in the garden by Shakespeare when he lived at New Place, and the second was planted in 1969 by Shakespearean actress Dame Peggy Ashcroft.

The special edition bottles will be available to buy at the Shakespeare's New Place gift shop on Chapel Street later this year.

Glyn Jones, Head of Gardens at the Shakespeare Birthplace Trust, said: "The mulberry has ripened earlier than expected this year due to the warm temperatures we've been enjoying.

"Rather than let the fruit go to waste, we approached our friends at Shakespeare Distillery to see if they could make use of the early harvest to produce a special batch of mulberry gin and we're delighted they said yes! Our team of gardeners worked with them to harvest the fruit and we can't wait to be one of the first to taste the fruits of our labour."



VEENO OPENS ITS DOORS WITH VIP LAUNCH PARTY

Italian wine cafe Veeno opens next week and BID members are invited to a VIP launch party at its Bell Court home next Thursday night.

The site is the first in the West Midlands for the chain, which specialises in family-produced Sicilian wine alongside authentic spuntini including platters of meats, cheese and other appetisers imported from selected Italian producers.

NEW STRATFORD HOSPITAL IS OFFICIALLY OPEN

Stratford's new hospital is officially open, boasting new state-of-the-art cancer and eye facilities.

Patients receiving ophthalmology treatment used the new facilities from July 24th ahead of the official opening on Friday, and The Rigby Unit and Café Lomas opened on Monday (August 7th). The £22 million hospital, which is hoped to become a centre of excellence in cancer care for South Warwickshire, was also the subject of a fundraising appeal that raised £1 million for special enhancements and equipment.

The Rigby Cancer Unit includes 12 chemotherapy treatment chairs and a range of facilities to support patients such as a complimentary therapy room.

The first floor of the hospital is a dedicated eye unit which includes eight outpatient consulting rooms, three treatment rooms with associated investigation rooms and a state of the art operating theatre making day procedures more accessible to communities who live in Stratford and the surrounding areas.

The ground floor is home to Café Lomas, a health and wellbeing hub which provides information and advice on a range of health and wellbeing services.
