# Traffic & Parking - have your say....

The fourth Stratford Transport summit on the 9<sup>th</sup> February saw the launch of the consultation period for the Stratford Transport Strategy. The draft strategy will impact upon all businesses in the town and we would ask that you take the time to consider the proposals and feedback.

The strategy has a number of aims including:

Reducing high car dependency particularly for travel to work and school;

Reducing through trips for motorised traffic in Stratford Town Centre;

Reducing the negative impact of traffic on air pollution;

Protecting the historic core of Stratford Town and supporting the visitor economy.

It does talk about creating a better town centre environment by trying to limit through traffic and it will have an impact on parking – this is critical for both staff, shoppers and visitors. We know recruitment and retention of staff is an issue and parking (or the comparative daily cost of it) has a significant impact on that.

Sensibly, the <u>strategy</u> tries to tie a number of pre-existing strands together.

#### It's not overly complicated or technical (which is a relief!).

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# Last Chance To Change Your Window On The World

If you're a business in the centre of town, you've only got until the end of the week to apply for Stratford District Council's 'Historic Spine' Shop Front Grant Scheme.

The deadline for grant applications, aimed to help regenerate Stratford's retail offer and provide a better environment for visitors and residents, is this Friday (February 17th).



Businesses can apply for up to 75% of the total cost of up to £10,000 for work including the replacement of a modern shop front and/or signage, restoration or repair and painting of an existing shop front, and re-instatement of historical, original or traditional architectural features.

To be eligible to apply premises must be located in the "Historic Spine" area which includes Bridge Street, Chapel Street, Church Street, Greenhill Street, High Street, Henley Street, Sheep Street, Union Street and Wood Street.

Stratford Literary Festival celebrates its 10th anniversary this year with a packed programme of top authors and speakers. The festival, which is an annual boost for footfall in the town attracting thousands of people, takes place between April 23rd and 30th.
